Alzheimer's Orange County and UCI MIND will host 28th Annual Southern California Alzheimer's Disease Research Conference on September 22

Annual conference will cover "sensitive" topics surrounding Alzheimer's disease and dementia care

The topics that this conference will address are common challenges that people living with dementia and their families face, but are often neglected."

"Being able to have an open and honest dialogue about the devastating emotional, financial and physical implications of a dementia diagnosis is the first step in reducing the stigma that surrounds the disease," said Jim McAleer, CEO and president of Alzheimer's Orange County. "The more knowledge caregivers, healthcare professionals, and even just the general public have, the better equipped we will all be to make our community a more compassionate and understanding place for those who are facing Alzheimer's."

The 28th Annual Southern California Alzheimer's Disease Research Conference will be held from 7:30 AM to 4 PM on Friday, September 22, 2017.
