Pimco expanding operations to Texas

Pacific Management Investment Co. has chosen Austin, Texas, for a new office as the firm seeks to recruit tech talent and broaden marketing in the U.S.

The office will open later this year and is expected to expand to about 200 employees, mostly new hires, by 2019, according to a

statement Tuesday. "Austin will play an important part in Pimco's continued growth and we are excited to become part of this vibrant, innovative community," Emmanuel "Manny" Roman, Pimco's chief executive, said in the statement.

Roman cited Charles Schwab Corp. as a model of a financial firm that established a facility outside California to recruit technologists. Since 2013, Schwab has been developing office space in Phoenix, Denver, Austin and Dallas.

We scrubbed the whole of the U.S. in terms of tech talent, location, airport, taxes, what have you," Roman said during the interview in Newport Beach. "But the core of the firm is staying here." — Bloomberg

Celebrating 30

California Faucets in Huntington Beach is celebrating 30 years of business. The family-owned business launched in 1988 and since then, the venture has expanded to modern bath, shower and kitchen technology.

It's safe to say bathroom tech has come a long way since the 1980s. The company's extensive catalog includes everything from traditional faucets and shower setups to sleek, "zero clearance" sink drains and the StyleDrain, which takes an ordinary shower drain and turns it into art at your feet.

The company was founded by Fred Silverstein. Five family members work at the company today, including Fred's children: son, Jeff Silverstein (president and CEO), daughters Tina Silverstein (marketing) and Sue Cuthbert (new product coordinator), and nephew Noah Taft (senior vice president of marketing and sales).

California Faucets, with 180 employees, told the Register it has produced hundreds of thousands of fixtures in its three decades. Items are sold in all 50 states and Canada with occasional projects in Asia and the Middle East.
